The Proclamation of the Word

A Reading from the Book of Sirach.

Honour physicians for their services, for the Lord created them; for their gift of healing comes from the Most High, and they are rewarded by the king. The skill of physicians makes them distinguished, and in the presence of the great they are admired. The Lord created medicines out of the earth, and the sensible will not despise them. And he gave skill to human beings that he might be glorified in his marvelous works. By them the physician heals and takes away pain; the pharmacist makes a mixture from them. God's works will never be finished; and from him health spreads over all the earth. My child, when you are ill, do not delay, but pray to the Lord, and he will heal you. Give up your faults and direct your hands rightly, and cleanse your heart from all sin. Then give the physician his place, for the Lord created him; do not let him leave you, for you need him. There may come a time when recovery lies in the hands of physicians, for they too pray to the Lord that he grant them success in diagnosis and in healing, for the sake of preserving life.

TODAY'S MUSIC

We are delighted to welcome violinists Kevin James and Lisa Taras as well as cellist Steven Smith to our service today. All have appeared in our recital series, and have also accompanied the Bytown Voices. Perhaps Johann Pachelbel's most famous piece is his *Canon in D*. It is a set of variations for three violins and cello. The canon (also known as a round) is between the violin parts. William Boyce (1711-1779) was one of England's leading composers of the 18th century. His anthem *Hallelujah* has hints of the famous Pachelbel *Canon* in it, hence the choice of the *Canon* for today's prelude. Mozart (1756-91) composed several 'Church' Sonatas—written in the 1770s to be played after the epistle when he was organist at Salzburg Cathedral. These short little gems are for strings and organ.
